## Ms Eluned Morgan MEP

Our guest speaker on 28th April was Eluned Morgan who is one of the four MEPs representing Wales in the European Parliament. Eluned was first elected to the European Parliament in play by the rules whereas 1994 at the age of 27- the youngest MEP in Europe at that time! She has a special regard for Brecon since it was the Brecon Labour Party who first nominated her as a candidate. The European Union and its legislative body have expanded considerably since she was first elected and there are now 27 member states compared with 12 when she first joined. Eluned spoke with great authority and obvious enthusiasm for the work of the European Parliament and tried to dispel some of the myths that bedevil any discussion

about the European Union in the important work being this country, largely as the result of a hostile press. In particular she was at pains to harmonising consumer laws refute the notion that we are the 'good boys' of Europe and the Single European Market other countries ignore them, pointing out for example that the UK lags well behind countries such as Germany in enforcing laws on recycling. She agreed that European Laws do need to be enforced more uniformly across the whole region. She explained that about 80% of the EU financial levies on member states goes back to the country of origin where it is administered by their national or regional parliaments, in our case the UK Parliament and the Welsh Assembly. This has brought enormous benefits for economic development in Wales. She also emphasised

#### Clive in India (continued)

Another delicious Indian lunch, then on to look around the Rotary Eye Hospital in Navsari, founded in the 1940s. Our host in Navsari, Hardik Naik, is a financial consultant - young and dynamic with a growing family, including his mother and a brother. Each Hindu family has a shrine at home, which is hung with fresh garlands every day. All our hosts were successful businessmen, medics or in the pharmaceutical industries. They support their Rotary projects with their expertise and business connections, as well as financially. All our meals in this coastal part of India were vegetarian, and there was alcohol prohibition here too, due to the influence of Mahatma Ghandi who lived there. After bidding goodbye to

our hosts in Navsari a six hour drive, westward this time, took us to Dhule, in the province of Maharashtra. Here the Rotarians were not able to host us in their homes, but put us up in a small hotel at their expense. We did understand that Indian families are very 'extended' and often include many members other than the usual parents and children we are used to. This often does not allow space for visiting Rotarians. Dhule Rotaract were holding a Trade Fair in the town, and were keen to show us round the Fair the evening we arrived, accompanied by a video camera, and a public reception. We now know how it feels to be celebrities, and to have to put on a brave face for the camera, even when you're tired and hungry.
