Botticelli's Bonfire



For their latest production the National Youth
Theatre of Wales

chose a very different theme from Whispers in the Woods, last year's production at the Sherman. Botticelli's Bonfire was set against the turbulent background of Renaissance Florence at the time of the Medici. The play's anti hero, Niccolo Machiavelli, whose name has become a byword for political intrigue, relives through a series of flashbacks the rise and fall of the Dominican friar, Savonarola. Seen by some as a saint and by others as a dangerous revolutionary he dared to challenge the power of the Medici, and even the Pope himself, a challenge which

culminated in the famous 'Bonfire of the Vanities' when he and his followers ordered the burning of the finery of the rich and privileged rulers of Florence in his quest to recreate Florence as 'the City of God'. (I hope you're following all this chaps as Peter will probably be including it in one of his quizzes at some stage!) In the play Machiavelli undertakes one last mission - to find with the help of the now blind painter Sandro Botticelli his famous painting, the Primavera, condemned as profane but rescued from the flames, and restore it to the resurgent Medici after the fall of Savonarola. Although set in 15th C Italy the play deals with themes of religious fanaticism and political intrigue and the lust for power and influence which

are still relevant to our own times. The large cast put on a lively performance which was very well played by the principal characters. We are grateful to Andrew for organising the visit for us and the meal at Tipple 'n' Tiffin beforehand.
